Sharing Reminiscences

We are pleased to print the words of Bob Williams, a society member now living in St. Augustine, Florida. Formerly of Lincoln Street, he responded to our request for personal narratives. In the *Winter Newsletter* we will publish Ethel Fulton's recollections of her youth in Hamden. Here are Bob's memories.

OLD CENTERVILE EARLY 1950'S

Walking down Washington Ave., you notice the Elm trees are still alive. On the right hand side at School Street is the Hamden Packing Co., which makes processed meats. At the next corner is Dixwell Ave. and on the right hand side of the street is the home where Ernest Borgnine was supposed to have been born. An Italian family who has chickens and a nice vegetable garden now owns it. In the summer time we get our tomatoes there. Going down Dixwell Ave. there is a used car dealer on the right. Across the street is Post 88 of the American Legion and the Hamden Chronicle headquarters. Just a bit further is a small luncheonette that serves a good breakfast. On the left hand corner intersection of Dixwell and Whitney Ave., is Charley Crook's Pharmacy. Inside you can get a great ice cream cone at their soda fountain. If I am lucky I am with one of my older sisters and the counter guy will give me an extra dip.

At bit down Whitney Ave. is Kimler's Headwear Store. It is a great place to get things like fishing lures and traps to catch muskrats in the wintertime. Across the street is the Citgo gas station and across from that is the Town Hall. It is an exciting time there as Herbert Hume has been elected. He is a Democrat and lives just a few blocks away from me on Washington Ave. I will have my singing debut at the Town Hall's yearly Christmas show. I will be up on the stage singing Jingle Bells. The Police Department is also located in the Town Hall, but it is only a small portion of the building. Across from the Town Hall is the Brownstone Restaurant. I believe the stone used there was quarried at Sleeping Giant. From Dixwell Ave. to School Street there is a pastry shop and two barber shops owned by Harry and Aldo. I believe they are cousins. When I go into Harry's for a haircut with my father, we have to sit in the back of the shop on a platform unit until we are called. Next to Harry's is a saloon, calling it a bar would be stretching the truth I am afraid. Across the street is Reilly's Restaurant.

Up Whitney Ave. just past School Street is the Pepsi-Cola bottling company. You can walk up the front door and watch the bottles on the assembly line as they are being readied for use.

Brown hamburger. Add remaining ingredients. Simmer, the longer the better.




