




EARTH DAY

ANNUAL MEETING

Stories of heroes and service were intertwined with a narrative history and photos of Hamden's firefighters during the presentation by distinguished historian Dave Johnson, Captain HFD (Ret). May's annual meeting had an audience of over forty attendees. They learned that volunteers were the front line firefighters from the 1800's up to 1924 when Joe Marks became the first paid fireman as a driver. Over the years, the fire fighting service evolved into a paid department. Today, three volunteer companies remain out of the original eight. We thank Dave for the fascinating lecture, Julie for the media assistance, and Betsy for the homemade refreshments.
